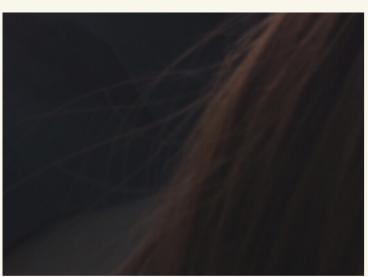




## THE CITADEL: ROSS CENTRE FOR DANCE

### LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

Our team wishes to acknowledge the land on which we operate, and our relationship to it as settlers. Each step leading to this evening's program has taken place on the traditional territory of many indigenous nations, including the Mississaugas of the Credit, the Anishnabeg, the Chippewa, the Haudenosaunee, and the Wendat Peoples. This land on which we gather to create dance is covered by Treaty 13 with the Mississaugas of the Credit, as well as the Williams Treaties, signed with multiple Mississauga and Chippewa Bands. The British, and then later Canada, used laws and treaties such as these to justify occupying and exploiting the lands of Indigenous communities across Turtle Island. As settlers, our team recognizes the privileges provided by these injustices. We are grateful for the original and continued caretakers of this sacred land on which we have so fortunately been able to create and share dance.



# 52 (NAVIGATION)

52 (navigation) is the expansion of a previous study in intimacy, form, and task-based improvisation. The work investigates the emergence of an abstract interpersonal relationship through the embodiment seemingly unrelated or slightly strange tasks. With an awareness of presence, patience, and vulnerability, two dancers navigate their relationships to the self, each other, and the structure of a world.

For myself, the term "to navigate" establishes a sense of faith and steadiness in the navigator. "To navigate" implies that there is something worth navigating for, even if we do not currently know its whereabouts. When I feel lost, unstable, and alone, the idea that I am navigating prioritizes faith in myself and a curiosity about what I may find. It helps me accept, and sometimes even enjoy, the process of navigating the unknown for a while in order to find something valuable.

This work shares a journey through the interpreter's body, watching her process sensation and emotion as she moves through space and time. within sensation seeks to bring the audience with she navigates performer as her experience, leaving you asking yourself, What am I holding on to? and, In what ways is it impacting me?

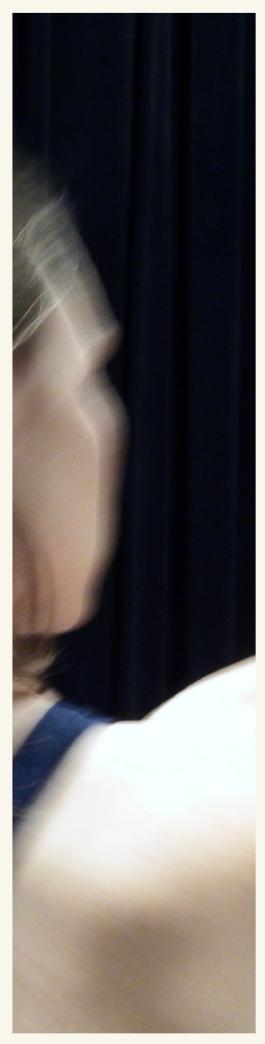

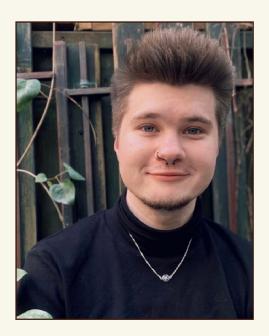
